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

TILL THEY ALL COME HOME:

A CONCERT TO MARK THE 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE ARMISTICE

3pm Sunday 11 November:

Melbourne Town Hall, 90 Swanston Street, Melbourne



The Melbourne Welsh Male Choir will mark the 100th anniversary of the WW1 Armistice with Till They All Come Home, a concert expected to fill Melbourne Town Hall and more on Sunday 11 November, 3.00 p.m.

The choir hopes that choir supporters including veterans and their families will make a day of it and come to the concert after the Remembrance Day commemorations.

RSL members are eligible for a concession price ticket.

The 50-strong choir will be joined by the 60-piece Australian Youth Band, together with "Australia's leading lady of musical theatre", Marina Prior, and music legend Mike Brady AM.

Till They All Come Home celebrates the music of both World War 1 and World War 11,

World War 1 led inexorably to World War 11 and, despite the passage of time, both wars continue to resonate globally. Both continue to have dramatic and lasting effects on Australia. So much horror, so much death, so many lives otherwise destroyed.

Through all of this, music both comforted and inspired.

Marina Prior will perform a Vera Lynn medley with the choir as well as "We'll Gather Lilacs", "Sally Pride of our Alley", "Wish Me Luck (As You Wave Me Goodbye)" and the Edith Piaf standard, "La Vie en Rose".

Marina's grandfather was a World War 1 ANZAC, as were all his brothers. He was shot three times and sent back to the front 3 times. He was only 19. She has all his records.

The Choir's program includes a medley of songs from both wars, a Gershwin showcase, and some Melbourne Welsh favourites "Cwm Rhondda" and "The World in Union".

With Mike Brady, they will also perform Eric Bogle's 1980 hit about visiting the grave, in Flanders, of a WW1 soldier Willie McBride entitled "No Man's Land".

The choir is delighted to be joined by Mike Brady. As readers of the Friends Newsletter may recall on ANZAC Day at the MCG this year, 10 of our choristers joined forces with members of the Australian Women's Choir to form the backing group for the debut performance of "This Place is Their Place", Mike Brady's song about the RSL. It was a great occasion.

At our concert, Mike will again perform this song with us, as well as another moving song of his, called "Let it Shine'."

Mike Brady's father, Robert, was a Dubliner who enlisted with the British Army in 1940 and landed in Normandy a month after D-Day, taking part in the fierce battles around Caen. His tour of duty was with the Royal Engineers. After the end of the war, he served in Malaya, repairing war damage and constructing airfields. Two of Brady's great uncles lost their lives on the Somme during World War 1.

The choir is also thrilled to have the Australian Youth Band (AYB) on board. The choir were the AYB's guest artists at their recent concert at MLC's James Tatoulis Auditorium in Kew and we are confident that they will produce the standard of accompaniment appropriate to such a special occasion.

The AYB is Victoria's premier youth performance ensemble and has performed all over Australia at popular regional festivals, major sporting events, marching band festivals and corporate functions. It's also done nine international tours.

Till The Boys Come Home: Songs & Music from World



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Wars 1 & 2 is the choir's best-selling CD. The concert was initially going to be called Till The Boys Come Home but the choir decided that, given the significant number of women who served, particularly during World War 2, it was more appropriate to use the more inclusive Till They All Come Home.

Melbourne Town Hall is the right place for the concert – it was a major recruitment centre during World War 1 and the Victorian centre for the Australian Comforts Fund (originally the Lady Mayoress' Patriotic League), which organised 'comforts' for soldiers on the battlefields.

Choir Member Profiles

Our profile this month is not of a chorister but someone who plays a vital role in the management of most of our choir concerts:-

Stage Manager - Mike Russell

Although Mike is not new to the Melbourne Welsh Male Choir, there would be many who are not aware of his 10-year involvement with the choir as a chorister over the last 30 years. Mike lives in Croydon South with his wife Marjie. They have 2 children, daughter Penny who is married, and son Anthony who is engaged.



Mike is semi-retired and still works a few days a week as a consultant in solar PV equipment. His other pastimes are tennis and golf.

The Russell family originally came from County Cork, Ireland, in 1850 and settled in Ballarat. His introduction to choral singing was by way of a Victorian Welsh Concert in Lilydale. It was Norm Maggs, who was a member of both choirs, who convinced him he would be happier at the Melbourne Welsh!

He first joined the Choir, as a bass, in 1990 under the leadership of Bill Mead and has fond memories of travelling to Georgia, USA, for the 10,000-voice concert in the Atlanta Astrodome. He left the Choir after five years but re-joined in 1997, under Phil Smith. He was part of the group that travelled to South Africa to the Eisteddfod in Roodepoort, Johannesburg. He resigned again in 2002.

We welcome Mike back to the choir even though he is not singing. We appreciate the time, energy and professionalism he puts into the job of getting us on stage correctly.

New Chorister – Will Morton (B1)

Will Morton moved to Australia from the UK in 1994, having met his Australian wife Kate while she was working in England. They have lived in Richmond ever since and they have two daughters, Charlotte and Jess, who are both young adults and starting to head off into the world!
