St David's Day Celebrations

MWMC Concert at MLC, Kew

On the evening of 2nd March the audience at MLC's James Tatoulis Auditorium, who had braved the heat and the public transport disruptions, were treated to a veritable feast of Welsh and contemporary music. From the stirring opening bars of Llanfair to the finale with the choir and soloists combining to sing You'll never walk alone, the applause said it all. Our guest artist Andrew Jenkins demonstrated why he deserved the Blue Riband he won at the 2018 Welsh National Eisteddfod with his sensitive yet powerful interpretation of the aria from Faust Avant de Quitter ces lieux followed by the patriotic Cymru Fach and the evocative My little Welsh home.

Not to be outdone, our guest soprano Chloe Harris sang Ivor Novello's beautiful Waltz of my heart, and then joined with the choir to sing a novel version of Ar hyd y Nos singing the first verse alone (in English) then combining with the choir who sang the remaining verses in Welsh.

The second half's combination of Welsh favourites like Rachie and Myfanwy together with a bracket of songs from Les Miserables and Carousel provided a perfect vehicle to showcase the talents of the soloists and the choir.

Gymanfa Ganu, St Michaels Church

The traditional celebration of community singing organised by the Welsh church and held at St Michael's Church in Collins Street, Melbourne (because the Welsh Church can only hold 150 people) continues to gather strength.

Despite the vagaries of the weather (with outside temperatures in the high 30s, the choirs seated in the



balcony were allowed to dispense with jackets and ties) and the loss of the original overseas conductor (due to illness), the audience were treated to, what many said, was one of the best Gymanfas they had attended.

The conducting duties were shared by Jeanette John (MD of the Geelong Welsh Ladies Choir) and Tom Buchanan (MD of the Australian Welsh plus two of the other choirs) with Sion Gough-Hughes acting as compere and providing the pastoral duties. With Huw Jones improvising on the harp and Andrew Jenkins as soloist plus members of six choirs in the balcony together with organ, timpani and trumpets, the audience was treated to a highly enjoyable afternoon of Welsh music and culture.


"An uplifting afternoon of Music"

The choir visited Bendigo's wonderful Sacred Heart Cathedral, in MacKenzie Street, for a Sunday afternoon concert, which I'm sure raised the cathedral's roof

(possibly the tallest in the country).

The wonderful Kate Amos. who one of our guest artists (the other was Teddy Tahu Rhodes) when we sang at the Ulumbarra Theatre in Bendigo last year, performed with us and delighted our audience once again. Kate's performance credits include Victorian Opera's Noye's Fludde and



Snowqueen, La Traviata, Hansel & Gretel and leading roles in Gilbert and Sullivan Opera's The Pirates of Penzance, The Mikado, and Lyric Opera's The Red Apple. Kate recently played Christine in Windmill Theatre Company's The Phantom of the Opera, receiving a Lyrebird Award.

Her numerous awards include: AME 'Opera Scholar of the Year', E & L Jullyan Academic Excellence scholarship and Sleath Lowrey scholarship.

Kate studied at the Fondazione Spontini Pergolesi in Italy after winning a scholarship through the Italian Acclaim Awards and recently was a Finalist in the IFAC Australian Singing Competition winning the Symphony Australia Prize, Merenda scholarship and UK Royal-Overseas League Award.

For what is now becoming the choir's regular annual appearance at the Recital Centre we are delighted to have the lovely Silvie Paladino as a guest artist. This will be the first time that the choir has worked with Silvie and we are really excited to have the opportunity to sing with such a darling of the stage and musical theatre.

As many will know, Silvie has had an incredible journey since 1989, when she was offered the role of Eponine in Les Misérables as an eighteen-year-old. She has subsequently enjoyed success on the London stage and as the lead in a number of Australian productions such as Hair, Cats, Miss Saigon, Sideshow Alley, The King and I, and Jerry's Girls Silvie's concert performances include lead artist roles with the Melbourne, Sydney, Tasmania and West Australian Symphony Orchestras, Australian Philharmonic Orchestra and the State Orchestra of Victoria. She has toured with Bangkok Symphony Orchestra in a series of concerts in Thailand

She is, of course a firm favourite with all audiences and viewers of Channel 9's Carols by Candlelight, Christmas Eve concert.

So yes, unknown and unmourned, but:


...I also had my hour
