#### **Mooroolbark Concert**

It was great to be back "in harness" on stage at the Mooroolbark Community Centre parading our wares to an appreciative, capacity audience for what is looking to be the start of a hectic performance schedule until the end of the year.





And what wares there were. With some new songs and old favourites, no fewer than four soloists (all choir members) and with songs being sung in five or six different languages - English, Welsh, French,

Portuguese, Maori and Latin the capacity audience was delighted with the variety and quality of the performance.

After a rousing and very traditional opening bracket featuring *Calon Lan, Shelter, Rachie* and *Y Darlun,* our president - baritone **Kevin Seerup** came on stage to sing *You're still you* (by Ennio Morricone).

An experienced amateur theatrical performer, Kevin has performed in such musicals as Annie, Kiss Me Kate, White Christmas, The King and I, Oliver, Rockin' Robin, Man of La Mancha and Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat.





Following the second bracket of songs - *They Call The Wind Maria, You Raise Me Up* and *Man of La Mancha*, tenor **Tony Meeuwswen** entertained the audience with the beautiful ballad from *Les Miserables - Bring Him Home*.

Tony has been performing since the age of 8 when he joined the "Hollands Jongenskoor" - the Dutch Children's Choir - as a boy soprano and went on tour with them to Germany and Belgium. He remembers rehearsing 3 times a week and had to give up soccer, much to his father's disappointment. In Australia he joined the Dutch Male and Ladies Chorale for a short while as a seventeen-year-old. He has sung with "Arion", the German Male Choir and for twenty years with Melbourne Male Choir (formerly the Melbourne Dutch Choir). He has also done solo work at various concerts, weddings and eisteddfods.

The last two items by the choir before the interval included the beautiful Maori lullaby *Hine E Hine* followed by the Elvis Presley classic *American Trilogy*.

After the interval the choir, in their Prosser tartan waistcoats and bow ties, opened with a bracket of old favourites including *Every time I feel the Spirit, Hallelujah, When I fall in love* and *Take me home*.



Another of the choir's first tenors, **Raymond Crooke** then took the stage with his guitar and encouraged the audience and choir to join in the chorus of a saucy French drinking song *Chevaliers de la Table Ronde*. One half of the audience had to sing "*Oui*, *Oui*, *Oui*" while other sang "*Non*, *Non*, *Non*". Everyone joined in enthusiastically. Raymond followed this up appropriately with a traditional American comic ditty "*Three pigs*".

The choir returned with the beautiful Welsh ballad *Y Darlun*, followed by the traditional Irish favourite *Danny Boy*, then Robat Arwyn's lovely contemporary arrangement of *Benedictus* and *Anthem* from the musical *Chess* (composed by the Abba team).

The last of the soloists from the choir, bass - **Mark Coffey** brought his beautiful double bass to accompany himself, supported at the piano, by our talented jazz pianist Simon Walters, as he sang (in Portuguese) *Garota de Ipanema* (which many of us would know as Antônio Carlos Jobim's "*The girl from Ipanema*". (Incidentally the second most recorded song in history)

The choir's last bracket was Cwm Rhondda followed by the acapella (and unconducted) tone poem from *Under Milk Wood – Eli Jenkins Prayer*.

The audience's demand for an encore was rewarded with the choir's wonderful rendition of the tongue twisting *Rhythm of Life* from the musical *Sweet Charity*.

### Background to another of the choir's favourite songs - Man of La Mancha



Man of La Mancha, based on Cervantes' epic 17th-century novel, Don Quixote, is a remarkable, poignant, moving musical that was one of the first shows to musicalize a piece of historical literature.

The original 1965 Broadway production ran for 2,328 performances and won five Tony Awards, including Best Musical. The musical has been revived four times on Broadway, becoming one of the most enduring works of musical theatre.

The arrangement the choir sings includes the three songs *Man of La Mancha, Dulcinea* and *The Impossible Dream.* 

Set in the context of the Spanish Inquisition, *Man of La Mancha* is presented as a play-within-a-play.

We encounter historical author Miguel de Cervantes in prison, awaiting trial by the Inquisition. When his fellow prisoners try to take Cervantes' belongings from him, including his manuscript, Cervantes proposes a trial in which he proves the merit of the manuscript through a re-enactment, enlisting his fellow prisoners as characters in his play.

Together, they tell the story of the aged Alonso Quijana who believes himself to be a knight errant, names himself Don Quixote, and pursues an obsessive quest to attain an impossible dream. Against all odds, Quixote and his trusty squire Sancho Panza take to the road in a quest to chivalry and seek out the good and innocent in a world filled with darkness and despair.

Through the story, all the prisoners – at least for a moment – are transformed. The mad Don Quixote may think a windmill to be a giant and a tavern to be a castle, but along the way he also transforms a wretched woman into a beautiful lady – and proves that an old man's belief can truly make him a knight. Man of La Mancha features such stirring songs as "Dulcinea" and the now-famous standard, "Quest" – more famously known as "The Impossible Dream."

Man of La Mancha started as a non-musical teleplay written by Dale Wasserman for CBS's DuPont Show of the Month program. This original telecast starred Lee J. Cobb, Colleen Dewhurst (who replaced Viveca Lindfors) and Eli Wallach and was performed on a television sound stage.

The DuPont Corporation disliked the title *Man of La Mancha*, thinking that its viewing audience would not know what La Mancha actually meant, so a new title, *I, Don Quixote*, was chosen. The play was broadcast live on November 9, 1959, with an estimated audience of 20 million. The New York Public Library at Lincoln Center, Billy Rose Collection, has a rare tape of this broadcast.

Years after this television broadcast and after the original teleplay had been unsuccessfully optioned as a non-musical Broadway play, director Albert Marre called Wasserman and suggested that he turn his play into a musical. Mitch Leigh was selected as composer, with orchestrations by Carlyle W. Hall. Unusually for the time, this show was scored for an orchestra with no violins or other traditional orchestral stringed instruments apart from a double bass, instead making heavier use of brass, woodwinds, percussion and utilizing flamenco guitars as the only stringed instruments of any sort.

The original lyricist of the musical was poet W. H. Auden, but his lyrics were discarded, some of them considered too overtly satiric and biting, attacking the bourgeois audience at times. Auden's lyrics were replaced by those of Joe Darion.

#### Want to join our choir

Interested in singing in four-part harmony ensemble, everything from full throated anthems to gentle love songs? If so then whether you've been involved in music all your life, sing in another choir, or only sing in the shower, come along to our rehearsals at Maroondah Federation Estate, 32 Greenwood Avenue, Ringwood and join in the fun and the stimulating learning process, that being a part of the Melbourne Welsh Male Choir is all about.

The choir is open to people of all ages from 18 to 88 and all nationalities.

Our current and past members include people with Scots, English, Irish, New Zealand, Dutch, French, German, Egyptian, South African, Tongan, Samoan and Australian ancestry.

So, provided you pass the (relatively simple) audition, you will be made most welcome.

While our musical heritage is Welsh, and we aim to have Welsh songs as a quarter of our concert programs (not necessarily all in the Welsh language), we are fundamentally a multicultural choir with probably less than half of us having direct Welsh ancestry.

We have an excellent rehearsal facility at Maroondah Federation Estate, with a grand piano, comfortable seats, good acoustics and facilities for tea and coffee at interval.

In addition, we have the best music director and accompanist combination in Melbourne.

**David Ashton-Smith OAM**, our Music Director, has a background as an opera singer, teacher and adjudicator, which shows in his coaching of our voice development and projection, as well as his role in teaching us new songs.

He is ably assisted by our talented accompanist, *Simon Walters*, himself a music director and arranger of some note.

We have mentors for each vocal section, who look after all new members, to ensure they are introduced to other choristers and are properly equipped with the relevant music scores. They oversee new members for the duration of the probationary period, help with pitch or pronunciation, where appropriate and answer any questions they might have.

There is a break for tea or coffee during rehearsals, which gives everyone the opportunity to mingle with other choristers. On the first Wednesday in the month, one of the sections provides the choir and our visitors with (a sometimes sumptuous) supper.

Car parking is plentiful and free, while Ringwood railway station is only a 5-minute walk away.

If you contact us on the phone numbers or email addresses shown in this newsletter, we will respond promptly and arrange for your introduction to the choir. Otherwise, just come along on a Wednesday evening at 7:00 p.m., introduce yourself and you will be made most welcome.

Once you decide to join, we will provide you with access to our web-based aids, which will assist you in learning and practicing the individual parts at home. This makes the process of getting up to speed with the Choir's repertoire much easier.

We also have Welsh language sessions, given by some of the Welsh speaking members of the choir, to help new and existing choristers in the pronunciation and translation of the words of the Welsh songs in our repertoire.

Following some rehearsals and a formal audition, you could be singing in one of our concerts within weeks and possibly joining us on our next tour.

Anyone who has attended our concerts at major venues such as the Melbourne Recital Centre, Ulumbarra Theatre Bendigo, Hamer Hall and the Melbourne Town Hall, or at smaller venues such as our venue for St David's Day Concert (the James Tatoulis Auditorium at MLC), will be aware that the choir has the skills and ability to produce and run high quality major events.

So, if you are an organization which might require anything from a short rousing opening to a conference or entertainment at a formal dinner(say), to a full two-hour concert, together with quality

The choir is available for community, corporate and sporting events, dinners, anniversaries, weddings etc., at most times in the year.

Bear in mind that we're talking about a choir of 40 to 50 voices plus a professional music director and accompanist. We have an eclectic repertoire, a great sound and provide excellent entertainment and value for money.
